As one views the positive statistics, programming elements, special events, and personalized profiles, an element that will become very clear is that the success of SBL involves many people, organizations and institutions.

From being hosted on campus by York University's Faculty of Education, to our partnership with Osgoode Hall Law School (see our section on York U), this demonstrates a thriving collaboration between a post-secondary institution and a non-profit community-based organization. This meaningful union allowed young people to get direct and early exposure to the university environment, while those employed by York received valuable experience working alongside the community in which their institution resides, Jane & Finch.

The students receiving their first high school credit has been quite the memorable experience. One would assume this milestone is solely based on the work of students, however, the SBL staff team, teachers, mentors, parents, and the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) all have a stake, and each played a vital role in ensuring the SBL participants walk into their new high schools in September with only 29 credits left to achieve.

Our Westview Mentors, many of whom were our enthusiastic mentees in previous summers, know the value of gaining an early start to high school first-hand. While they are supporting their mentees, many are also earning coop credits towards their own milestone of high school graduation, while being employed for the summer. Behind this double-dose opportunity are the TDSB Continuing Education and Focus On Youth (see our section on the TDSB).

As one peruses the accounts of the summer program, the real story of what took place emerges. It is mentees that have become mentors, and mentors that have grown into recreation staff. It includes teachers that are building community, and funders that have become partners. Also, community members that offer their skills and experiences. Plus, community agencies that want to collaborate rather than compete. It is institutions that see the value of community in achieving shared goals. And of course parents that inspire us all to give our best. Combined, it is a living illustration to the young people involved with SBL on the power and the benefits of collaboration.

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#Results

CLASSROOM EXPERIENCE:

97% of students felt that their SBL classroom experience was positive.

94% of students were interested in what they were learning in the classroom during the SBL summer program.

92% of students felt that they could ask their teachers for support, which is inline with the finding that 89% of students felt that completing assignments during the SBL summer program was an easy task.

SUPPORT & BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS

98% of students developed good relationships with SBL staff (core staff, mentors, teachers).

72% of students felt that they could talk to their teachers about a social/ personal matter.

92% of students felt that they developed strong friendships during the program, and 59% stated they will stay connected to peers they met during the program.

PURSUING POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

Following the SBL summer program, 98% of students felt that they will graduate high school and 98% also stated that they want to attend post-secondary education.

Following the SBL summer program, 100% of SBL mentors stated that they will attend post-secondary education.







CAPACITY BUILDING & EMPLOYABILITY

*Programming

Mornings in the Classroom

Summer 2015 was our third year at Osgoode Hall Law School on York University's campus where over 100 Grade 9 students worked towards earning their first high school credit. In the mornings they spent time engaging in Literacy, Numeracy and Life Skills.

The morning classrooms were designed to offer support for students while they picked up valuable new skills and experiences. This process was supported by current Westview students who fulfilled the role as Mentors.

The teacher student ratio is 1 teacher for every 15 students with a group of mentors (3-4 per class) working within the classroom together. This is designed to enhance learning and allows the teachers and mentors to adequately address the needs/ exceptionalities of each student. Of the 7 teachers involved in the program, 6 are returning teachers who have built strong relationships with the mentors and staff over the years.

Many of the youth enrolled in the program are transfer students (a student who is transferred to secondary school but has not met the curriculum expectations) and are given the opportunity to learn through culturally relevant pedagogy, with peers within their community, innovative curriculum and wrap around supports within the classroom.

Hip Hop Literacy in the Classroom

It has been 3 years since SBL first piloted the Hip Hop Curriculum- even before its publication into the new curriculum guide Rhymes to Reeducation. Since then, classrooms across Ontario have implemented the curriculum with great success. This summer, SBL brought new lessons into the classroom that engaged youth across a myriad of social justice topics. Lessons ranged from the critical examination of communities with structural differences, to the construction of social identities. With Hip Hop culture at the core of each lesson, students were highly engaged. Teachers used the lessons as starting points, but ensured there was room for student input and up to date cultural references.



On Time & Ready to Learn

We offer transportation for all of our youth in the program. Our youth live in every area of the Jane and Finch community and get picked up at key places such as: Brookview Middle School, Oakdale Park Public School and Firgrove Public School.

Bringing youth from different areas in the community to York University each day speaks volumes to the work we do around community building and breaking down barriers. Getting our SBL youth to York University is definitely a priority and being mobile to the various Friday trip locations is important, especially to the students!



#Fuelitlep

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Ramadan

During the summer months, many students and staff were observing the month of Ramadan. For the first 2 weeks of programming, we made it a priority to provide accommodations for those who were fasting. These accommodations included, but were not limited to the following: Providing designated and equipped space to do activities for those who were not eating during the breakfast and lunch periods; providing a prayer space throughout the day; and alternative activities were available during the afternoon.



Supporting Every Learner: Class Sizes

SBL positions students for success by removing potential barriers to academic achievement, while providing much needed supports. A key element in removing potential barriers is the student to support staff ratio. Each classroom was capped at 15 students with 1 TDSB teacher, 3 mentors and 1 volunteer all providing academic support. Along with additional academic support, smaller class sizes enabled deep-rooted relationships between mentors and mentees.

This led to conversations about the anxieties of entering high school, the dos and donts in high school and general relationship advice. It felt less like a classroom and more like a large family where youth are highly engaged and willing to participate in their education – whether it was academics, life lessons or social skills.



Celebrating Excellence: Graduation

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Play Day

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Lost Lyrics

This year SBL had the pleasure of collaborating with Lost Lyrics- a mobile learning incubator that attempts to bridge the gap between the streets and the classroom through relevant and engaging curriculum.

SBL and Lost lyrics partnered to provide photojournalism workshops centered on self-advocacy. Youth engaged in a photo scavenger hunt that allowed them to investigate and explore how photography allows them to share information about their community-through their own lens. Youth began to clearly understand self-advocacy and resiliency by analyzing their community and its conditions.





Archite XT

Future Builders is a summer camp run by ArchiTEXT, which is focused on introducing young people to the world of architecture. Inspired by the work they are doing, we partnered with them to deliver one of their customized modules in our summer program. ArchiTEXT ran a workshop with our teachers and mentors who selected the module on "Drawing as Communication" as the one they would learn together and teach collaboratively.

The results were remarkable, seeing our mentors delivering the module with our teachers, each putting their own voices into the lesson, while illustrating the fact that the principles of architecture apply to many areas of life (and are a lot of fun).



LAWS:

Exposure is ultimately one of the core elements that adds to the success and value of the SBL program. Each year SBL partners with the LAWS program to deliver engaging programming around the justice system, critical thinking and building exposure around legal professions. Students get the opportunity to experience the intricacies of our judicial system first hand through mock trials.

In addition, youth engage in workshops that provide them with the tools and resources necessary to make critical decisions, build their confidence and to better understand their own strengths. The students develop vital skills such as problem solving, teamwork and critical analysis- all of which they will use in their schooling and beyond.



Kids-Up-Front: PanAm 2015

As we all know, this was the summer of PanAmania! The city was buzzing with PanAm excitement for a great majority of this season. Through our partnership with Kids Up Front, SBL was able to provide over 250 tickets to the various 2015 PanAm sporting events to the youth and their families involved in the program!

We are aware that several barriers often leave the youth and families in the community disconnected from the initiatives taking place across the city (especially in the downtown core). The access provided to the PanAm events through Kids Up Front however, provided the opportunity for youth and their families to reconnect to their city, build relationships and meaningful memories.



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Jays Care Community Club House

The Jays Care Foundation is one of the primary supporters of our summer program, and as grantees we are given the opportunity to attend a Blue Jays game in the Jays Care Community Club House each year. On June 30th, thirty-five SBL mentors and staff cheered the Blue Jays on to victory.

With our summer program starting only a few days later, it was an incredible way to bring our team together and celebrate the success ahead of us with one of our great partners. We say this every year (because it always gets better), but this was the best time we had in the Jays Care Community Club House!



3D Printing Workshop: Toronto Public Library & Fort York Library

When we heard that the Toronto Public Library had 3D printers, we knew we had to find a way to connect to this amazing resource. As a part of our morning programming, each of our seven classes attended a workshop at either the Fort York or Toronto Public Library sites where they were given an introduction to 3D printing and a chance to turn an idea on a computer screen into a tangible piece that they could take home. This was a great opportunity to continue to build on the work we have been doing as a part of the HIVE Toronto network, prioritizing digital literacy and closing 'the digital divide'.



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Virginia Beach to Jane & Finch

This summer, two classes had the unique opportunity to play Jeopardy against students from Virginia Beach. In partnership with Everfi, the PK Subban Foundation and From One Hand to Another (Pharrell Williams' Foundation) students spent time preparing for the Jeopardy Style Hockey Themed Trivia Challenge and we are proud to say SBL came out on top in the hockey themed trivia.



Special Visit: P.K Subban

Shortly after the cross border Jeopardy game, PK Subban surprised the entire program with a visit and swag (new PK t-shirt, water bottle and Gatorade) lighting up the faces of all the students, mentors, and teachers. Osgoode Hall Law School and York were abuzz with excitement and energy!



Exposure: Career Day

Success Beyond Limits Summer Program 2015 was another successful summer where we had a diverse set of guest speakers from different backgrounds. They brought life, experience and wisdom into the space and for that we are grateful. We had speakers from a wide array of career avenues such as media, non-profits, and education.

We want to give a very special thanks to the following speakers who came out and devoted their time to the youth in the program; Mawuli Chai, Segun Akinsanya, Zakaria Abdulle, Dula Osman, Ameen Binwalee, Sherese Bleary, Jaime Sutherland, Louis March, Kadeem Reid and Michelle Smith. They all came out and shared their triumphs, challenges and tactics with our youth on how to get ahead.

The sessions were filled with questions from curious mentees who were engaged and ready to absorb the very real life experiences being shared, thus, preparing the mentees all the more ready for the challenges of life and high school. Career day is integral to the success of the summer program as it allows the youth to see and relate to people from similar circumstances that made success out of their individual and collective challenges.



Learning & Building Through Play: Friday Field Trips

It is an amazing opportunity to gain a greater love and appreciation for the city we live in. Students and staff look forward to each Friday, and not because it's the start to the weekend but each Friday we went on a field trip to various locations. The whole program received an opportunity to bond while travelling to; Richmond Hill for bowling and again for the wave pool; Etobicoke for gokarting; North York to roller-skate; and downtown for a day of fun and a BBQ by the lakeshore.

Movie Days

The Nat Taylor Cinema in York U has been our get away place each Thursday afternoon to screen films of interest for our youth. Watching any film with 150 people that you know day in and day out can be an interactive experience. From the serious moments in the film to the laugh out loud moments; our youth made it clear that having an afternoon to sit down, relax, and enjoy a good film can go a long way in a packed summer program experience.



SBL & YouthRex:

Evaluation is a key component for not only telling our story-but telling it the right way. This year SBL has had the opportunity to work with Youth Rex- an organization dedicated to ensuring youth voice is captured to develop a comprehensive, specific and relevant evaluation. This partnership allowed us to strengthen our evaluation process and develop a deeper understanding of our reach.

SBL core staff and YouthRex worked collaboratively in developing valid and reliable measures and means to not only uncover but to also convey the success of the summer program.

Debrief Week

After six-weeks of the summer program, mentors spent an additional week reflecting back on the summer and provided valuable insights from their perspectives. Feedback from the youth is essential to ensuring that the summer program is indeed youth led and engaging and it is this vital feedback that debrief week aims to extract.

Additionally, this year, mentors took part in a workshop that required them to set goals for the upcoming year. Each of their objectives looked very different as some mentors are off to post-secondary school, others returning to high school and some also entering the workforce. Wherever they decide to go, SBL staff will surely check in and see the progress they're making ensuring they stay connected to the program and its supports.

The end of debrief week saw mentors trekking across the City of Toronto on our second annual scavenger hunt. The evening wrapped up with a dinner recognizing the hard work put in by all the mentors this summer.



Space Matters: Osgoode Hall Law School

All of the program elements that make our summer program what it is (from nutrition and transportation, to our teachers, credits and mentors) combine to have great impact through one key ingredient: space.

Every morning our students filed into the light filled hallways of the Osgoode Hall Law School. The view over breakfast and lunch was Black Creek, with the skyline of the Jane strip in the background. Anyone that has taken or worked in summer school can testify to the importance of air conditioning (or the lack thereof) on learning and motivation. Access to comfortable temperature spaces, state of the art classrooms, tutorial rooms, and assembly areas allowed us to deliver on the ideals of differentiated instruction, and set a tone of excellence. Beyond the attributes of the physical space, there has been the impact of Osgoode staff, students and faculty members embracing our students and staff as a part of the Osgoode community.



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UCEC Summer Institute 2015:

The Social Determinants of Education: Redefining the factors that drive educational success

York Center for Education & Community (YCEC), a valued partner of SBL, combines a focus on education and community which is a practice that SBL embodies. The monthly contributions and knowledge sharing between SBL and YCEC happens throughout the school year with an emphasis on planning YCEC's yearly summer conference. The two day conference that includes workshops and panel discussions allow presenters and all in attendance to receive information of various practices to enhance their professional development and to build on the collaboration between community and education.

From August 27th-28th SBL sparked thought provoking conversations regarding how our education focused programming is rooted on assisting youth to mitigate the outside factors that are negatively impacting their ability to focus on their schooling and achieve consistent, positive educational outcomes.

In hopes to illustrate the social determinants of education, the connection between the roles these factors have on students' educational success was presented by SBL staff. This allowed the audience to critically participate and assist in developing a plan towards a more well-rounded approach for addressing student achievement.



On the final day of the conference SBL Program Manager, Kaneka Watkins engaged in an educational dialogue sitting on a panel with the Deputy Minister of Education, George Zegarac, Durham District School Board Director, Matryn Beckett and TDSB Principal, Alison Gaymes San Vicente. With a focus on equity and inclusive education, critical conversations on; school-community partnerships, closing the achievement gap and bringing awareness to aboriginal issues were discussed. Following the panel's presentation, the Honorable Jean Augustine provided the audience and panel members with a dynamic response leaving all with the sentiment that we are not where we should be, but we aren't where we were.





TUSB Partnership

Our summer program can be compared to a watch; on the surface you see the face and the hands moving, keeping time, but behind that face and those arms that turn continually is a complex arrangement of gears and mechanisms that make it all happen.

Our partnership with the Toronto District School Board is a key part of what drives our work forward, and the parts are as numerous as those gears, and reach throughout the school board to make the opportunities we provide possible.

Westview serves as our year-round home, and the launching pad for the summer program every year. The support of Westview takes place in many forms as; the Urban Priority High Schools' funds removes key barriers to participation, the staff of the school play an important role in ensuring we have the students that need to attend SBL are engaged, and the administration continue to have a strong presence with us throughout the summer.

Our feeder schools, Brookview and Oakdale Park Middle School, work with us tirelessly in engaging grade 8 students as they are preparing to begin their secondary school careers.





TDSB Continuing Education have been vital in the innovations we have developed from small class sizes, to the full-credit we offer in-coming grade 9 students, and the dual-coop credits our youth mentors are able to earn while employed.

The TDSB Focus on Youth program provides us with the backbone of our program – our youth mentors – through the summer employment provided to students in Jane and Finch. The support of transportation, nutrition, and small class sizes from Focus on Youth were fundamental to the success of our summer program.

Support of our local Superintendent Jackie Spence, our Trustee Tiffany Ford, the partnership and research departments were key in engaging so many of the arms within the TDSB that make what we do possible, and we thank the many tireless supporters throughout the TDSB.



York U Partnership

York University and Jane and Finch are one physical community, and as the nearest post-secondary campus to our community, running our summer program at York is important to the goals of our program, including exposure for our mentees to the postsecondary environment before even starting high school.

Our host on campus and partner from day one is the York U Faculty of Education. From navigating the process of booking amazing spaces across the university, providing access to resources on campus, to engaging us in the York Centre for Education and Community Summer Institute, they commit countless hours to making it all work.

In 2013, we moved our program to the Osgoode Hall Law School. Since then, this partnership has grown exponentially, welcoming us into the Osgoode community, while contributing to greater impact in our program.

York U Community Relations, the York UTD Centre for Engagement and Community, the Art Gallery of York University, the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, the Faculty of Health, the Faculty of Fine Arts, and Tait Mackenzie all find ways to make our presence on campus meaningful.





UNIVERSITÉ UNIVERSITY

Our charitable trustee, the York University Faculty Association provides access to important resources, while contributing to the growth of our organization.

The York University Faculty Association Community Projects has been a supporter of our work since it was first piloted in 2006, and have been fundamental to exploring and testing many of the innovations that we have implemented over the years.

While this seems extensive, our relationship with York U is only going to grow from here. In the meantime, we wish all of our SBL Alumni that will be new York students in September success as they work their way toward becoming York Alumni.



Mentor Training

Our mentors bring with them various personalities and skills to the role. Before the camp starts rolling, it was vital to get this group of mentors familiar with each other, as they would be working alongside one another for 6 weeks during the summer.

SBL staff and partner agencies collaborated to present half a dozen sessions and workshops centered around-classroom management, being an effective mentor, conflict mediation, summer role and responsibilities, mentor and teacher orientation, program planning, and health & safety.


Getting Ready for Another Amazing Year: Head Start Day


Staff Profile: Mohamed Ahmed
