


INTRODUCTION

We also took this year's group down to City Hall and spoke with a sitting Toronto City Councilor, had a tour of City Hall and discussed in-depth how decisions are made that inevitably shape our communities. If we had to pick one word to describe this year's March Break Career Exploration Program, it would be well-rounded. And the conversations our young people had with the professionals from various careers, fields and walks of life were more about their journey to where they were rather than the heights to which they have ascended. While working hard was a general theme, the key takeaways for the youth this year was that there are many paths, twists and turns to get to where you ultimately end up, and where you're supposed to be and that's ok.






ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

HIP HOP LITERACY



For the Hip Hop and Tech workshop, SBL Youth learned about the social conditions that produced Hip Hop! As well as the creativity of poor, working class Black and Brown youth in New York City that made Hip Hop possible! SBL Youth also explored the connections between politics and how decisions made by politicians structure neighbourhoods. We made connections between the South Bronx and Jane and Finch and how creativity sparked the hip hop movement! For the second half of the workshop we explored the elements of hip hop: Mcing, DJing, Graffiti, Breakdancing. During the course of the workshop, SBL Youth were able to try their hand at creating their own 'graffiti tag,' listened to some samples and even watched a DJ demonstrate to them how to cut, mix and scratch. SBL Youth left the Hip Hop Tech workshop with a deeper understanding of the ways hip hop - the art and the culture has always been both creative and political.



TRANSITION TO POST-SECONDARY

No matter the path, this post-secondary transition brings with it feelings of excitement, curiosity and anxiety. To ease the uncertainty, we took a trip to Ryerson University where our young people got a crash course on what to expect as a university student, what it means to be a well-rounded student, and financial does and don'ts. The trip ended with a tour of Ryerson's campus and we soaked in the sights and sounds of Ryerson's Student Learning Centre and hung out on their beach themed 6th floor.



PICTURE PALACE AT TIFF

When it comes to quality sound, projection and imaging in film everyone knows that TIFF is the best place to be in Toronto! Therefore, it is not a question why TIFF would feature Picture Palace, an exhibit that allows its visitors to learn more about lighting, colour, framing, movement, sound and effects. This exhibit allowed for self-expression where our youth were able to get into character by trying on different costumes and to test out the equipment that is needed in film production. 


EXPLORING CAREERS

A DIFFERENT BOOKLIST

We partnered up with A Different Booklist to offer everyone an opportunity to choose a book of his or her choice, on us! This bookstore offers a variety of books that feature authors of colour who may not be found in mainstream bookstores. This has sparked an interest in some of our youth to read more. This interest stems from youth relating to the stories presented by authors that look like them. Our traditional trip to this bookstore has been a great way to end off the March Break Program.

CITY HALL

Our March Break was filled with important conversations centred around the future of work, the current state of education, and recent financial changes to OSAP. What guided these conversations where the important questions young people were asking throughout the week, which ultimately culminated in a visit to City Hall. As we entered the lobby, we marvelled at a model replica of the City of Toronto, immediately locating Jane and Finch. We had the opportunity to get a tour of the Council Chambers and sit down with Councillor Jennifer McKelvie to bring together all that we learned from the week and we ended with the many new questions our young people were just beginning to ask and explore.


